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A Note from Pastor Bill

This is the April newsletter! Just a day or so ago it was Easter! What a wonderful Easter celebration we experienced! As I reflect on the amazing celebration that is Easter, I often consider how quickly we lose our Easter excitement with the normal day-to-day chaos of life and the many pressures that weigh so heavily on our shoulders - impossible schedules to maintain, endless doctors appointments, family commitments, etc. It is so very easy to quickly pass by the excitement of Easter and return to the struggle that is Lent. In so many ways, we live in a Lent world instead of an Easter world. How can we change our hearts to be an Easter people? That's a tough question!

In our recent study of Hebrews, we touched upon one of my favorite verses in the Bible. Hebrews 11:1 says, "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." This scripture speaks to me about how to live into the Resurrection life in a post-Easter world. Sounds like a good sermon series. Yes, it actually is! Welcome to the April worship series. This conversation reminds me of a story I heard years ago. I will do my best to repeat it here for you.

There once was a man who was lost in the desert, dying for a drink of water. He stumbled upon an old shack — a ramshackle, windowless, roofless, weather-beaten, dilapidated old shack. He looked about this place and found a little shade from the heat of the desert sun (reminds me of Jonah from the Old Testament and the leaf that covered his head as the sun beat down upon it as he awaited God's judgment upon Nineveh). As he glanced around in the sweltering heat, he saw an old, rusty water pump about 15 feet away in the blazing sun. He stumbled over to it, grabbed the handle and began to pump up and down, up and down, over

and over, again and again. Nothing came out. Nothing!

Disappointed, he staggered back. He noticed off to the side an old jug. He looked at it, wiped away the dirt and dust and read the message written on it: "You have to prime the pump with all the water in this jug, my friend. P.S. Be sure you fill the jug again before you leave."

He popped the cork out of the old jug and sure enough there was water. It was almost full of water! Suddenly, he was faced with a decision. If he drank the water, he could live. Ah, but if he poured all the water in the old rusty pump, maybe it would yield fresh, cool water from deep down in the well — all the water he wanted. Yet, he would risk having no water and possibly dying.

He studied both options. What should he do — pour it into the old pump and take the chance on fresh, cool water or drink what was in the jug and ignore its message? Should he waste all the water on the hope of those flimsy instructions written no telling how long ago?

Reluctantly he poured all the water into the pump. Then he grabbed the handle and began to pump. Squeak, squeak, squeak. Still nothing came out! Squeak, squeak, squeak. A little bit began to dribble out, then a small stream flowed, and finally it gushed! To his relief, fresh, cool water poured out of





the rusty pump. Eagerly, he filled the jug and drank its refreshing contents.

Then he filled the jug for the next traveler. He filled it to the top, popped the cork back on and added these words to the little note: "Believe me, it really works. You have to give it all away before you can get anything back."



A Note from Pastor Bob

I have known a number of people who think that the world would be much better if we just put daily prayer back into our local schools! They reason that they had daily prayer, and the schools weren't dangerous or mean back then. The theory is that the Supreme Court eliminated prayer from school...now look at how bad schools are!

But we also remember that we could pray when we needed to do so. On the days we showed up after skipping our homework, maybe sleeping a bit late, only to find that our teacher was going to give a "pop quiz" ...and we were pretty sure that we wouldn't pass it! What we some of us did then was to whisper a quick prayer. It went like this "O God, please get me through this one Lord." And if you were in the full bargaining mode, you might even add, "then I'll be good, from now on, honest!"

I have been discussing with you about how the Christian Nationalists, have usurped many aspects of religion in pursuit of religious freedom as they define it. Prayer is one of the tools/weapons they like to use to prove their stance. They usually say that the "terrible" and "evil" government eliminated prayer many public places but specifically from "our" schools. The government "plan" is one step further to subvert our Christian heritage! Perhaps a question could be asked to clarify this position, "did the school prayer rulings ban all forms of religious activities in public schools?" The Christian Nationalist would answer



"yes". From this position they conclude that the absence of prayer absolutely explains today's bad behavior by young people which is compounded as they become adults and contribute to the many ills of our society.

But the Court rulings did not limit religious activities in public schools!! It is important to remember that the Supreme Court never struck down truly voluntary prayer in public schools. It did, however, invalidate school-sponsored practices that required participation, by declaring those practices are deeply coercive.

But Public-school students have the right to take part in voluntary religious activities that do not cause a disruption or infringe on the rights of others. They may pray silently during the school day, read religious books during their free time and talk about religion with willing friends. In fact, many schools have voluntary religious clubs alongside other types of student-run organizations. Further, public schools may teach religion objectively as an academic subject, and even discuss its role in history, art, and literature.

I once explained this concept to a Disciple Class some years back. Many of my "students" were older than I and were very concerned about the safety and teaching of their grandchildren. They didn't want them to be exposed to all sorts of serious social issues in their schools. The usual claim was that none of those problems happened in their day...they were positive that our present issues arise mostly because the school day wasn't starting with prayer.

I explained what the Supreme Court decision actually was. But then I posited to them, a "work around" the court's rules. What if we asked our local schools to have a daily prayer led by differing religions? For example, Monday would be a Jewish prayer, Tuesday would be a Buddhist prayer, Wednesday would be a Moslem prayer, Thursday might be a Hindu prayer, but Friday would be a Christian prayer. My class considered the matter and decided that my solution was unacceptable. Why, they said, would we want our children and our grandchildren to be forced to hear these prayers of other faiths? I softly said, "what makes you think that all the parents of the children of those different faiths want their children to be forced to hear a Christian prayer every day?" After a few moments of reflection, the class agreed that the Courts ruling on prayer was a fair interpretation of how religion should be treated in our public arena.

I struggle with the Christian Nationalist positions. It seems that their idea of religious freedom for them is that we all have to think of any religious precept in light of their terms, and their conditions. That concept, my friends, is a violation of the first amendment. Remember we have both freedom of, and freedom from, religion. And that is guaranteed! YIC, Bob
