The Journey With Christ

The season of Lent is one of the two penitential times in the church year, the first of which is the season of Advent. Both of these seasons are seen as a time of waiting, either for the birth of Christ, or Christ's resurrection. However the season of Lent isn't just a time of waiting. During this time, we are called to walk a journey with Christ as he prepares to die on the cross. We are moved and inspired by the Holy Spirit to not only look at Christ's life during this time, but our own lives.



The season of Lent begins after Transfiguration Sunday. As I wrote about in last month's article, this Sunday focuses on and celebrates the story of Christ's divinity being revealed to the disciples in the most epic of mountaintop experiences. The disciples want to stay and bask in God's glory, but Christ reminds them they cannot stay there. They have to descend down into the valley where the work must be done. Christ knows the journey He is about to embark on and that his crucifixion was soon to come. Lent begins the following Wednesday on Ash Wednesday, and we begin the journey of self-reflection on our own shortcomings and failures.

A Note from Pastor Bill

Welcome to the season of Lent! Over the last couple of weeks, many church members have asked me about the season of Lent. Why do we celebrate Lent? What is it? What do we need to do? Why do we have a church season called Lent? In just a few short weeks, we will find ourselves at one of the most joyous times of the Christian year - Easter. We will join United Methodists and other Christians across the world to celebrate Easter! I can't wait!

The journey towards Easter begins with Ash Wednesday and continues through the season of Lent.

What is Lent? Lent is a season of forty days, not including Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday, the day before Easter. Lent began as a period of fasting and preparation for baptism by converts to the church and then became a time for penance by all Christians. You may find it help to fast from something during the season of Lent as a Lenten discipline. You may find it helpful to fast some of your precious time to take something else on, such as reading of your Bible, prayer, etc. The First Sunday of Lent describes Jesus' temptation by Satan, and the sixth Sunday (Passion / Palm Sunday), Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem and his subsequent passion and death. Because Sundays are always little Easters, the penitential spirit of Lent should be tempered with joyful expectation of the Resurrection. So Sundays are feast days when we rest from our fasting.

I invite you to join me as we observe a season of Lent. Let us prepare our hearts and minds to walk along with Jesus as we journey with Jesus to Jerusalem. Let us prepare our hearts and minds to hear those who cry out to Jesus for deliverance, the tears of joy of those who experience Jesus' healing love, the schemes of those who would destroy him, the shouts of those yelling "crucify him," and the broken heart of Jesus as he said from the cross, "Father forgive them for they know not what they do."

Let's prepare our hearts and

minds for a holy Lent. One of the spiritual practices that I love is to pray hymns just as we would pray the Psalms. I invite you to join me in prayer as we continue the journey of Lent and meditate upon the words of the wonderful hymn "Lord, Who Throughout These Forty Days" found in our hymnal as No. 269.

Lord, who throughout these forty days, for us didst fast and pray. teach us with thee to mourn our sins and close by thee to stay.

As though with Satan didst contend, and didst the victory win, O give us strength in thee to fight, in thee to conquer sin.

As thou didst hunger bear, and thirst, so teach us, gracious Lord, to die to self, and chiefly live by thy most holy word.

And through these days of penitence, and through thy passion tide, yea, evermore in life and death, Jesus with us abide.

Abide with us, that so, this life of suffering over past, An Easter of unending joy we may attain at last.

What a last verse! Yes, Lord Jesus, bring us to an Easter of unending joy!

Music Ministry

After Christ's Transfiguration, He begins his journey to Jerusalem, healing and teaching as he goes. He casts out demons and foretells his death and resurrection. Throughout His entire ministry, the disciples struggle with who Jesus is and what he is about. When the disciples ask who among them is the greatest, he reminds them (and us too!) that their thoughts should not be on how great they are for what they do, but that they should be humble. He confronts social norms and questions regarding the law and religion, and reminds them (and us) that he came not to abolish the Law or the Prophets but to fulfill the Law and the Prophets. Jesus confronts a rich man who has kept the law and asks what he must do to inherit eternal life? Christ tells him "Go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." (Mark 10:21). Are we ready to set aside our own burdens, preconceived notions, baggage, pride, guilt. and follow Christ?

The season of Lent culminates with three major events in the church calendar, which fall into Holy Week. We begin Holy Week with Palm Sunday. This Sunday marks Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. He is greeted by shouts of Hosanna and given all the praise fit for a king entering the city. How then in just a short week do those shouts of hosanna turn into shouts of crucify? How do we react to Christ when our expectations of Him do not line up with the Christ we see in the Gospels?

On the night before his trial and crucifixion, Christ shares a passover meal with his disciples. When he breaks the bread and pours the cup, he shares with the disciples that this represents his blood and body which will be given for all people. Jesus then goes to the garden to pray, and asks the disciples to stay and pray with him. How often do we fail, and we too like the disciples, fall asleep or leave our Lord alone and deserted? Christ prays that this cup may pass from him as he knows what is about to happen. He is soon arrested.

The next day he is mocked, beaten, tried by Pilate, forced to carry his own cross, and then crucified. The King of the Jews is dead and the shouts of "Crucify Him!" still linger in the air and in people's hearts and minds. Were we there too shouting to crucify him? How in such a short time did we go from shouting hosanna to shouting crucify?

For this year's Good Friday service on March 29th at 7:00pm, our Sanctuary Choir and soloists will be performing a lesser known work called *Olivet to Calvary*. The text is written and arranged by Henry Shapcott Bunce, with the music being composed by John Henry Maunder. This beautiful piece of music will lead us through this journey that Christ takes and help us to come to grips with why their hearts, and our hearts, so quickly turn from hosanna to crucify.

The piece outlines the entirety of Holy Week, beginning with Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem. We hear the shouts of Hosanna from the joyous multitude in the crowd and hear their mis-understanding of who Christ is and what he will do as the crowd says *"Hosanna to the Prince who comes, to free a race oppressed! To drive the Gentile from our land and make His people blest!".* We see Christ weep over Jerusalem as he knows the time will come when the city will be overtaken and the temple will be destroyed. While Christ does come to free an oppressed people, it is not in the earthly manner in which they expected.

We see Christ overturn the money changer tables in the temple. We are challenged that our response should not be anger or fear, but to tell Christ: "Another temple waits Thee, Lord divine, The temple of my heart, O make it Thine!"

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We see the dark and lonely garden of Olivet as Christ prepares for the last supper with his disciples and that there will be no joyous multitude there in the garden with him later that night. In the last supper, we are minded of God's compassion, unconditional love, and grace through his suffering and death. We are reminded that our response to this amazing love demonstrated for us that we should follow Christ's new commandment. A new commandment give I unto you that ye love one another; even as I have loved you, so love ye one another.

We journey with Christ to the garden where where we hear his prayer:

"Thy will be done" the Savior said, And bowed to earth his sacred head The sands of life had nearly run "My, Father let Thy will be done, Thy will not Mine, be done."

How often do we too forget to pray that God's will is done and not our own?

Christ is betrayed and forsaken by the disciples, his closest friends whom he loved, and arrested.

O was there ever loneliness like His: From the drear garden of His agony, The sinless One was led. His followers all forsook their Lord and fled; No gentle tone, no kindly glance was there, but mocking faces, and harsh words of hate The cruel soldiers, the unpitying crowd. Despised of men, rejected and forsaken! O was there ever loneliness like His!

Christ is tried by Pilate where the crowds shout "Crucify Him!" As he is marched to his death carrying the cross, we hear the same music that accompanied the shouts of Hosanna during his triumphant march into Jerusalem. However, this time the music is presented in a minor key. Christ is crucified and after he breathes his final breath, the choir reminds us of the hope in the resurrection that is to come.

Droop, Sacred Head, Upon that breast divine, The strife is over, The victory is Thine.

Hush, sounds of earth, Sink sink thou mournful sun, On Calvary's cross, Lo! mercy's work is done.

Gaze, mortal gaze, The Savior hangs for thee, Silent in death, Upon the accursed tree.

Love, holiest love, Shall earth and heaven atone, In fadeless day, From Christ's eternal throne.

I invite you to come walk this journey with us on Good Friday on March 29th at 7:00pm as our Sanctuary Choir and soloists lead us in this moving and powerful time of reflection. WIthout Christ's death, there can be no resurrection.

Safety Response Team

Response Plans are Posted – Please Read, and Ask Questions!

The Response Team (FUMC's Safety Team) has published our Response Plan. We will be posting copies in classrooms and other common areas.



CONTENT: This plan describes events that may occur at the church, and what to do in case of each. It is a general reference that will help you to focus when specific types of things happen, so you can act quickly and appropriately. We do not expect that you memorize these, but we do want you to know what this document is - and where to find one when you need it.

FORMAT: The plan is divided into sections. Tabs at the bottom describe each page, so you can flip to the one you need quickly and easily.



ORIENTATION: After Easter, we will announce a date when all Sunday School classes will meet for a short orientation session. This meeting is your opportunity to get familiar with this document and ask questions. Members of FUMC's Response Team will be there to describe the plan and the Response Team's role at the church. After the presentation, classes can head to their rooms and resume their scheduled studies.

We look forward to your questions. It is our privilege to serve you as the Response Team. We want to make sure that you are aware of the church's approach to security. Together, we can keep FUMC a safe and welcoming place to gather and worship.

A Note from Pastor Bob

I am continuing to discuss some of the points that are raised by those thought to be Christian Nationalists. The official motto of the US is "In God We Trust". Since the phrase is everywhere these days you might think that it has been our motto since the founders established our country in the 1780's.

Actually, there was no official national motto until the summer of 1956. We had an unofficial motto which is the Latin phrase "E Pluribus Unum" (which means Out of Many, One). This phrase has filled the role unofficially from the beginning...it even appeared on the Great Seal of the United States adopted in 1872.

So that means that the phrase "In God We Trust" does not have its roots in the founders period. The first coin minted by the US government actually said, "Mind Your Business"! There was a proposal for "In God We Trust" submitted by a Pennsylvanian state minister to Salmon P. Chase during the Civil War. Chase liked the idea but changed the wording a bit to "God is Our Trust", but he finally settled on "In God We Trust". The phrase first appeared on a two-cent piece issued in 1864, then sporadically until 1955.

The move to adopt the religious statement as the country's official motto came during the height of the Cold War. The motto's proponents argued that an explicit reference to God would set the US apart from the Soviet Union which was officially atheistic. They also argued that "imperialistic and materialistic communism seeks to attack and destroy freedom". So, "the United States should look for ways to strengthen the foundations of our freedom". In God We Trust became our motto in July, 1956.

The idea that our nation is one where many (states or people) come together to be one country. It was a new idea. There were at least two flags during the American revolution that played heavily on that idea. Many Americans suffered personal losses and sacrificed at a great price in order to have a larger picture for the establishment



of their new nation. Unity really expressed their hope for their vital young nation.

In my opinion "E Pluribus Unum" is a concept we seem to have lost. Democracies have not fared well in world history. They haven't lasted very long. Our American experiment is approaching 250 years old, longer than any other. I often wonder if our leaders would emphasize our past motto "E Pluribus Unum" then we might find ways to build bridges between our fighting factions, not walls.

And consider this, I have a thorough and complete trust in my God. We are approaching a population of 400 million people. Even if everyone is a theist, we each have our own experience, our own dealings with the Holy Other. There are somewhere near 3000 denominations, just in the Christian church. Considering our UMC fracturing in the past few months as well...why is our statement "In God We Trust" a unifying one? Doesn't it cause people to choose a facet of the Holy Other they know while usually denying other experiences. Mostly because these new ideas don't match their understanding of God.

And that's why our national motto *should* reflect a unification emphasis. After all, it is an action we can take! In the meantime we can begin to see our fellow citizens as children of God, just like us! I think some hardy discussions will help us out from here on...but not fighting over whose faith is best, while denigrating our fellow citizens' experiences with the Holy Other!
